FROM THE MINISTER

POWER

I said to somebody recently that it might be a good idea for all power outlets to be switched off for one day each year, essential services like hospitals and so on being left on. This would make people do normal things differently, like read a book, talk to actual people, walk to the shops and so on. Of course, while we do have Earth Hour, this suggestion will never happen and I'm not really on a hobbyhorse with it. But we do depend on power usage for so much and increasingly.

Another form of power is with people themselves, especially those who hold high positions and seek to get things done. We all know the phrase 'Power corrupts and absolute power corrupts absolutely'. I've always valued those words in the gospels where Jesus says such things as "If anyone would be first, he must be last of all and the servant of all" and about himself Jesus said, "The Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

Personally I have always much preferred the word 'empowering' to 'power' because it's truer, and it also keeps alive the sense of being given power for something useful and good. So again, in the gospels, Jesus says, "The Son of Man has power on earth to forgive sins" and the sinful person – not the Lord – is the beneficiary. The disciples too were given power "to cast our demons" and "to have power over unclean spirits" leaving troubled people free of their torment.

We begin to build up a picture that all power is given to people to use

for greater good. It can come in all sorts of ways. If you are eloquent, you have the power of persuasion. If you are charismatic, you have the power of attraction. If you are organised, you have the power to set up and run a team, and if you are physically strong, just think what you could do. All of these can be used for good or for harm.

So with this in mind – empowering, not only being powerful – it isn't a surprise that one whole chapter in 'Heaven and Hell' is all about the power of the angels of heaven. You might like to read it, in paragraphs 228-233 but we'll just mention a few interesting things from it. Some people, it says, think that angels are so pure and vapoury (my word) that they can't have any power, but angels are spirits and it is our spirit – our will – which gets our body doing what we tell it to, not the other way round.

There's also the point that myriads of bad spirits can be put to flight by a true word from one angel. Numbers count for nothing with angels, nor do tricks and cunning because they see through them and shatter them there and then. It all sounds a bit cosmic, but it happens here at times, perhaps less dramatically. A group of people discuss a situation and come up with ideas, and then someone says, "But this is simply ridiculous!" and everything changes.

The most important point though is that angels have all their power from the Lord, not from themselves. And they only have their power as they acknowledge that it comes to them from the Lord. Forget that, and it disappears!

So I think that the main things for us to pick up from all this are that we have power, that we may have more power than we realise, that we can misuse our power if we're not careful, that we carry the responsibility of having the power we do, and that we watch it like a hawk and keep it clean, yet use it with all our might to bring about whatever changes need to be made.

Think about empowering rather than raw power.



What our cells can teach us



A conversation between Dr Bruce Lipton and Tami Simon

THE PILLARS OF NEW CHURCH BELIEFS



Continuing a series on our beliefs in plain English. This time we'll think about **holiness**.

The word *holy* is closely linked to two other good words – heal and whole. Some churches offer healing services to help people become whole. Today, most people know that a holistic approach to life means looking at everything together, mind, body and spirit.

This is very different from the popular idea of holy as something set apart or revered. A church building can be seen as a holy place – or place of holiness – because people get help from its quietness, or feel its atmosphere or the beauty and awe of its décor. It is not of the world.

So while we might need and value such helps and reminders, we shouldn't limit holiness to them. There is personal holiness in many people's lives when they live sincerely, act authentically, carefully manage the way they respond to the people they are with and choose to join in things or not join in as they see fit.

People like this set their personal standards very high but they aren't walking around in white robes. You might not notice any difference about them to anyone else, but when you get to know someone like this fairly well, you begin to sense there is something special about them.

So try and see holiness more completely rather than compartmentally. It all comes from God and this is the ground of everything holy. See it in ordinary things like a box of matches or a toothpick – yes it's there. See it in astounding things like the motionless hovering of a hawk and its sudden plunge. But most of all see it in humanity and the endeavours of those who wish good to all others.

Wherever you see it, God is being received in holy ground.
