

The New Church in Australia Family Camp Phillip Island Adventure Resort 29th December 2014 - 4th January 2015



As we commence the New Year many will be reflecting back on a very successful camp. The weather had its highs and lows but generally was very good and enabled people to get out and about on Phillip Island in the afternoons if they wished.

A big thank you goes to Rev Martin Pennington and his team of support people namely Len & Judy Robinson, Marian Mansaray and Peter Stanton who ensured that the camp ran smoothly. The feedback from many who attended was it was very enjoyable and organised in an excellent manner.

It was great also that Melinda Robinson, Stan & Elizabeth Deutscher Shinae Pennington, John Cook, Susan Heldon and Justin Keane were able to be present from Victoria. The presence of 21 people from Queensland including 4 young families and 15 from Perth with two young families which added to the atmosphere and it was also good to have people from Canberra, Sydney, Alice Springs and United Kingdom. The accommodation configuration at the venue enables couples and families to have their own rooms and these are closely located to the dining room and main hall for activities.

In addition to the organised leisure activities in the afternoon such as Flying Fox, Giant Swing, Water Slide, canoeing and time spent in the pool etc. There were two outside trips arranged. One was on the free day which was a two hour cruise to see the seals just off the Nobbies and the other an evening visit to the penguins. 

When he entered the visionary phase of his life, Emanuel Swedenborg set out on a journey to document all that he had seen, heard and learned while in contact with the spirits of heaven and hell. THE PILLARS OF NEW CHURCH BELIEFS

Continuing a series presenting our beliefs in plain English.

This time we will look at the idea that **God is present** with us.

I read about a lady whose husband had died and how she said that now he isn't in the next room or in the city, but was present with her all the time. "I talk to him of course".

That's a helpful bridge for the truth that God is present with us all the time. He isn't only present with certain people (whatever they might think about that!) and he isn't only present when we are being good. He's never not there ... and that's true for every single person.

The real starter is that for us to be alive, God **must** be present, keeping us alive by giving us our life all the time. I often think that's the main thing God does - he just keeps flowing in. It's not done with clockwork; we are not "set going".

But that is only part of it. God is present with us, and knows our deepest wish, every motive and unknown (to us) fear. He always knew them. We can't keep anything from God. God isn't judging anything about us; he is only concerned with how he can help us find our way and feel right, or whatever it is we need.

But God, being on the inside of us, won't suddenly press buttons to make things happen. I would almost say that he "tweaks" or adjusts things. If he is present and isn't doing anything, that seems absurd. It is not all up to us and yet God wants us to feel that it is, and yet God "tweaks" slight impulses which we pick up on.

The aim - as far as God is concerned - is for us to respond to him (or at least to what is better than before). If we get to that, then God isn't just present (like he always is), now we're joined to him and he can be more joined to us. It's a working relationship. Like that lady who lost her husband said, "I talk to him of course as he's always with me now".
