FROM THE MINISTER

BY THEIR FRUITS YOU WILL KNOW THEM

One of the troubles with a great analogy is that it often takes over from the actual message. I first realised this many years ago when I watched a Bible Study TV program from Atlanta, Georgia where a dozen ladies were using a passage from Luke's gospel where it says, "Even the very hairs of your head are all numbered" and within seconds these ladies were comparing notes on hairstyles, hair dryers, which hairdressers to go to, and how important it was for their husbands to have wives to accompany them looking their best.

The actual Bible message never came into it. It got lost in the swaps. So beware these Biblical analogies and correspondences that can very quickly take us right away from the truth we're being urged to see. Which brings me to 'fruits' and to the Harvest which we are celebrating this month.

Fruit obviously conjures up pictures of fruit bowls and those shops with impeccably placed piles of shining apples, red side facing outwards. Yes, such things are Biblical, at times. The Lord's bounty is abundant and the fruit – vines, figs, olives and so on – is the crowning of the year. So, yes, we give our thanks as we should.

But there are times in the Bible when fruit should not make us think about fruit! A good example is right back in the garden of Eden where God told Adam and Eve they could eat of every tree except the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. You know what happened. The

serpent told Eve it was not only okay to but they'd be like God! And Eve saw and took and ate and gave some to Adam. And their eyes were opened.

It wasn't a crunchy apple! The fruit was simply the result of what they did. It made them into different people. So in the same way we say 'the fruits of our labours' and in the Bible it talks about 'the fruits of repentance' and the analogy is telling us that keeping going with something usually ends up with success, and a changed heart always ends up with you being a better person. Notice the connection between 'ends up with' and 'fruit'. And the message is loud and clear.

When Jesus said 'By their fruits you will know them' he was giving a warning about false prophets. He said that they come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly they are ravenous wolves, and finished by saying you will know them by their fruits. Who on earth are they, these false prophets with fruits?

Put aside for the moment any thought of actual people, people who seem real nice (that's the sheep's clothing of course) but you wonder if they're after something. We're not meant to sum other people up, just be a bit careful at times. So, instead of false <u>prophets</u>, think about false <u>notions</u> instead. Coming your way, and in sheep's clothing, oh yes.

Here's a false notion. We think, "If I didn't make sure, things just wouldn't get done." But (we protest), that's so true! So there's our first layer of sheep's clothing – it's nice to be needed. It probably isn't even true. If you stopped, things would have to change somehow. But the fruit of it all is that you start feeling misgivings, and Jesus regularly tells us we shouldn't hold onto misgivings.

So when you get your notions – many of which will be true and beautiful ones – check them out by where they leave you and what you end up with in your heart. There's the giveaway, the tell-tale sign, and that is what Jesus is warning us about by mentioning fruits.

And yes, by all means, enjoy the fruits of the harvest. Julian



Jesus' suffering and our suffering

One of the people attending our meetings believes that if we understand Jesus' suffering to a certain degree, we will also understand human suffering better. She has been reflecting on this matter for some time and this talk is the outcome of her wishing to know more.

Areas that Julian is intending to include in the talk are:

Suffering, and what do we mean by this?

The fact of suffering.

Different kinds of suffering.

Different degrees of suffering.

Suffering we cannot do anything about and suffering we can do something about.

Jesus' suffering and our ability to know and understand this.

The Divine itself cannot experience suffering.

The extent of Jesus' suffering and its degrees.

The uniqueness of Jesus' suffering and its special nature.

The relationship between Jesus' suffering and our suffering.

Does (Did) Jesus' suffering in any way affect, lessen, alleviate, heal, take away our suffering?

Finally, how can we make personal use of Jesus' suffering to help our own suffering, the suffering of others and the general suffering that exists or goes on in this world.

page 10 BEHIND SOME WORDS

I have chosen some words beginning with G: Gratitude, Guidance, Grace and Gain.

Gratitude seems to go much deeper than Thankful. It feels it is more from our heart and spirit. It comes from a word meaning 'favourable' and it often carries the idea of being glad to be like this and not like that. Because of this, it evokes both appreciation and hopefully compassion. It's the best word we have to use for deeper things in us, such as peace of mind, a living faith and our own personal relationship with the Lord, for all of which we are knowingly grateful.

Guidance is something we all need at times, but it means being led well by what we know. That's its origin; it comes from a very old word 'to wit', to be aware of, which we also get in 'witness'. For us it's about being willing to let our mind, with all that it has received, shape the course of any actions and even more override some of our feelings. And the Lord himself is guiding us all the time if we are willing to hear him.

Grace, interestingly, comes from the same word-origin as gratitude but it has a very different connotation. Gratitude is from us to God, grace is the other way round, from God to us. It's the favour which God always feels towards every thing He has created; it's the undeserved love that God has for us, and it is that brief moment when we are strangely caught up in the sensation of being in God and we call this, being in 'a state of grace'. It is the word of the last verse of the Bible: 'The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all.'

Gain means to improve your situation in some way and it is used in the parable of the stewards, "Look, Lord, you gave me five talents and I have gained for you five more." And Jesus spoke of the utmost folly of gaining the whole world while forfeiting one's own soul. It comes from an old word meaning 'a farm' so it suggests spiritually the work that is involved in us working the farm of our own life and bringing it to productivity and higher yield.

THE PILLARS OF NEW CHURCH BELIEFS



Continuing a series on our beliefs in plain English. This time we'll think about the idea of **temptation**.

Temptation has become a bit of a vogue word covering what we might immediately enjoy but may well regret later. There are songs and movies with the title. You can see it involves an attraction or, a better word, enticement, to whatever that may be.

In the New Church we see temptation being a kind of war between evil spirits and angels, who are there with us. Each of them truly loves their divergent view of things and they would love us to get drawn into their delight about it. This might sound a bit like Star Wars but as far as we are concerned, it becomes the flavour of the thoughts, prompts and feelings that pop into our head at times. We certainly aren't dealing with a second chocolate biscuit!

Why doesn't God stop it and call up twelve legions of angels to win over our soul by sheer force of numbers? He won't because it would be outside of us, and God wants us to see, choose and work on it from inside ourselves because we know what we really want and we are prepared work for it.

It's as close to you as your eyelashes. We should learn to listen to our own chat: 'Why do I bother?' 'Come on, you know what matters.' 'That person has it in for me.' 'I've always felt happiest doing my best.' Or however these things come to you.

One of our temptations is to cover our ears so that we don't hear the din. Very tempting, just do what's required. Unfortunately that takes us into torpor and we're not even aware what suggestions come our way.

The Lord Prayer catches the need brilliantly: Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. Meet the need ask for help.

page 12 THE BACK OF A LEAF



I love looking at the backs of leaves where the stem and the veins are clearly seen. It shows how the plant provides food and life for every part of every leaf to keep it in full health. It's attractive because it makes an embossed pattern.

Then I look again and realise that the pattern I am looking at is in fact basically the pattern of the whole tree, in miniature. The stem is like the trunk, the branches are remarkably like the main branches of the tree as it rises up, and the veins are twiglike. I see the shape of the whole tree in each of its leaves.

It reminds me that God made man in his own image and likeness (Genesis 1:26). And I really love the way that this gets shown only on the back of the leaf, a bit out of sight, tucked away for us to discover when we're ready to see it. But that's how God does most of his things.

FINAL FABLE

(based on a personal experience)

I drew up behind a large bus at the traffic lights, in the left of two lanes. I was turning left. The bus sat equally over the two lanes in the middle of the road. I fumed. "If you're turning right, you should be in the right lane; if left, then the left lane. You'd fit! Now I am back here and you're so slow to go, I will miss this change of lights."

Then I realised the skill of the bus driver. As cars turned from the main road into our shared road, they needed considerable space to get round the waiting bus. The driver was giving them room and consideration and had thought ahead. I felt ashamed.
