FROM THE MINISTER

THE MAGNA CARTA AND NEW CHURCH DAY

Sometimes it's good to take two things and put them together and see what comes up. I was fascinated to catch the news that during June this year it will be 900 years since the signing of the Magna Carta by King John at Runnymede on the River Thames on June 15th 1215. I've seen the original in the British Museum. It was basically a charter guarding the rights of ordinary people against the divine rights – often, the impositions – of the monarch.

New Church Day, on June 19th, which we celebrate each year in some way, is about several things. It's about a clearing-up in heaven of untrue beliefs about God, it's about bringing people back to a true belief that the Lord Jesus Christ is God, it's about opening up the Bible to be able to understand it spiritually rather than only literally, and it is about our need to live conscientiously by what we know is true. What New Church Day is <u>not</u> is a command for us to believe and live by everything the church might tell us we must do in order to be saved and go to heaven!

So, when you put the Magna Carta and New Church Day together and look to see if there is something similar in both of them or something you get from comparing them, the answer is a definite "yes". They are both about the rights and the responsibilities of individual people and they are both about curtailing the power of a higher authority.

I like the fact that they are both dated as the middle of June – June 15th

and June 19th and when I do the 'put them together' thing, what I get is that they are both happening just before the longest day of the year (in the northern hemisphere of course) on June 21st, when the sun (which is such a good picture of the Lord's light and life over us) is at its highest and longest in the sky. It feels 'right' to be dated like they are.

I can take the comparison even further. The Magna Carta was signed on the banks of a river, so it gives us the idea of something flowing rather than being held back. Runnymede means 'water-meadow' and that's what it is (wear your wellies if you ever go there) and it is 200m from the Thames. But New Church Day is just as wet and watery because it's about us having the truth or 'water' and about the flow of this truth from the Lord into our own minds, hearts and lives.

Let's keep going, with the idea of a stream. We're told that the angels know that there is one fountain of life, which is the Lord himself, and that our life is a stream which flows from it. I hope that in some way you feel that yours is and that knowing this helps you. We're told that when we trust the Lord's careful management of the way in which our life proceeds we are then in the stream of divine Providence and we know that all things that pass are leading to our spiritual well-being.

That is like an invitation to us: rather than just wonder what life is about or whether God is doing anything, 'go with the flow' and trust the course of your life as much as you can. A stream or river has the wonderful ability to carry a boat along which will keep following the underlying currents. It's such a good description!

When we celebrate New Church Day – and we're doing that on Sunday June 21^{st} – keep it clear, keep it simple, keep it personal. What we are celebrating is that people can rightly (and responsibly) have their own relationship with the Lord, and be able to understand the truths of life and be led to live by what they believe is true.

New Church Day becomes our Magna Carta. Happy New Church Day!

THE GREAT SHE BIBLE

I came across this news item recently and found it quite fascinating and interesting to share...

A rare 400-year old Bible worth at least \$100,000 has been discovered at a parish church in Lancashire, in England. It is one of the earliest known copies of the King James Version of the Bible. But its rarity lies in the fact that when it was printed around 1611, for some reason an 'S' got added to a reference to Boaz who married Ruth. In the book of Ruth chapter 3.15 this Bible says of Boaz "She went into the city."



Only a handful of She Bibles exist, mostly at universities like Oxford and Cambridge and cathedrals like Salisbury and Exeter. It's thought that He and She Bibles were printed at the same time but on different printing presses.

How to think smarter and act more wisely

What are intelligence and wisdom? How can we grow wise? Surrounded by so much information, how can we know what is true? Can we recognise wisdom in others? How do we learn? How do humour and a willingness to take risks relate to learning? How do we make sense of things?

If exploring such questions appeals to you, you'll be in the right place when you come along. We will look at what wisdom is, how to grow in it, how we learn, dealing with doubt and certainty, and how to obtain insights.

As we grow older it is important to be more focused and efficient at getting the gist and recognising what things are of value to know. So come along with your open mind, your skeptical mind, and your humorous mind. The presentation will include a 20 minute film clip which draws on Swedenborg's accounts of his spiritual experiences and what he learned through these experiences (featuring Curtis Childs of the Swedenborg Foundation and Dr. Dan Synnestvedt of the Swedenborg Academy).

Joe Vandermeer has been studying Swedenborg's teachings for a quarter of a century. He is greatly interested in the subtle and profound influence which Swedenborg's spiritual ideas have had on various streams of thought and movements. With a keen interest in those ideas which have renewed and inspired people through all times, Joe hopes to share those ideas which remain relevant, powerful and suitable for us in our modern life. Joe formerly served as president of the Swedenborg Association of Australia for five years.

AKH "BROTHER"

The Bible word for 'brother' is 'akh', with a raspy sound like 'Loch Lomond'. In the New Testament it's 'adelphos' which gives us Philadelphia which means love of brothers. When the Jews used the word 'akh' they weren't limiting it to family members but more widely, to other people, whether men or women. So in this sense, 'brother' is thinking about all others.

One of the famous Biblical uses of 'brother' is very early, in the sad story of Cain and Abel, actual brothers. Cain was jealous that Abel's offering pleased God more than his own, and he killed him. God then asked Cain "Where is your brother?" and Cain said, "Am I my brother's keeper?" God said, "Your brother's blood cries out to me."



The Jews believed that repeating the same word several times gave it much more emphasis. So, the Bible is really saying as a take-home message that, yes, we are all indeed our brothers' keepers. The moment we forget that we lose out.

Quite likely, most people wouldn't think that we need reminding about something so obvious, but modern culture emphasizes our individuality and independence so much, sometimes to the point of amazing self-centredness.

This is perhaps why the story of Cain killing his brother Abel is the first story after the Garden of Eden (where self-awareness came into being), pointing out that the first and most serious loss we can have is to lose our sense of loving others.

Behold how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell together in unity. Psalm 133.1

THE PILLARS OF NEW CHURCH BELIEFS



Continuing a series about our beliefs in plain English. This time we'll think about living a MORAL LIFE.

Let's start off with the main teaching of the New Church about this – that living morally actually begins to open us up towards living spiritually. The one helps the other.

If we are living morally – doing our best, thinking before we act, holding back on making bad choices and so on,

we set the scene for us to be able to see the spiritual things about life – such as love being essential, that we will live for ever and that there is God who loves us and leads us.

It's like a child learning to read, recognising the sound of each letter to begin with. He struggles, forgets, wants to play on his computer instead yet he can get to the point where reading takes him over. He loves it! That wouldn't happen without the first part.

This teaching also brings things the other way round. When we are spiritual, with our belief in God there, we live a moral life (like we did before) but now we do it because we understand it's what God wants us to do. It becomes our intention, our evidence, as we carry out what we believe in

This teaching is the reason why we aren't a church which advocates particular kinds of prohibitions. We're not against smoking or drinking; you don't have to give up eating meat, nor will we frown at you if you buy a scratchie. But we're not exactly in favour of some of them either! It's really up to you, with what you believe, to set your personal standards.

The Ten Commandments make a good start, especially in their expanded version where stealing is not only about embezzling but can happen when we shatter someone else's belief that helps them to live. So a moral life is also a way of living that thinks about other people.
