### Being a Short Term Pessimist and a Long Term Optimist

It is years now – no, it has to be decades – since I heard one of my then senior colleagues in the ministry of the New Church describe himself as "a short term pessimist and a long term optimist". Intrigued by what he meant, and asking him about it, I have never forgotten it. In fact I have come to "own" the statement as true of myself and have both shared it with – and urged it on – others.

My colleague, to whom I am referring, was speaking at the time about the state of the world with regards to which he was emphatically, he said, "a short term pessimist and a long term optimist". And the reason I have myself taken it on board is because like him I have come to believe that this is a position validated from countless statements and teachings in the Heavenly Doctrines, or Writings of the New Church.

Few things are more certain or more widely affirmed than that at the present time the world, and humanity, is going through tremendous change. For me personally, and being just one example, advances in technology and gadgetry make of education and a modern school almost unrecognisable to what, as a boy, I remember it being. But rapid and profound change is across the board, embracing attitudes, sensitivities, access to travel, job opportunities, communication and all the rest.

What is far less understood and appreciated is that the changes taking place are not just the outcome of social evolution. They are in fact the outcome of profound changes and shifts on the spiritual plane of life.

New Church Teaching has it that we are living through the end of one spiritual Age and the ushering in of another. It is not the first experience of this that the human race has gone through over its history and existence. The previous such time came about with the advent of the Christian era. Then, too, so many mindsets, practices, and behaviours were challenged and relinquished, even beyond our being able to quantify today. And the same is happening now. New light, new awarenesses, new understandings and new appreciations have been - and continue to be sweeping in from the spiritual world, setting change in motion. The abolition of slavery and of child labour (both of which are not vet universal) are cases in point. And look at the way attitudes have changed with regard to the sexual exploitation of children. Metaphorically, of course, but I nearly fell out of my chair when I read that as recently as the 1970's, and in Britain, representatives of a paedophile-rights Group (the "Paedophile Information Exchange") were sought out to give interviews to the media and invited to appear at University Conferences! (See "The Economist", August 8<sup>th</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup>, 2015, and an article published in it, "See No Evil").

For a new Age to become established the debris of the previous Age has to be cleared away, and the word that is used for this in the Writings of our Church is "vastation". For one thing it means that things hidden need to come to the surface to be seen – and judged – for what they are. There is considerable pain that arises in connection with this and many people suffer. But it has to be this way. To this day and in some parts of the world, slavery, racism and the ownership of women by men continue to be stoutly argued for and defended. No wonder, then, that change is painstakingly slow and over generations. Hence, *short term pessimism*, as we live through upheaval, conflicting ideas, fiercely argued and defensive mindsets and as unimaginable evils come to the surface and are carried out. But long term it is different.

I love it where in his book, "True Christian Religion", Swedenborg was given to write of successive spiritual Ages over the course of the history

of humanity on this earth, from the outset (see para. 786). It was the way the Lord always knew it would be. As with each individual, the human race has gone through – and is going through – ages and stages towards its adulthood and towards a living, insightful, believable and mature relationship with Him. And we are, today, moving on towards that. It is the promise of the New Jerusalem come down to earth (Revelation Chapters 21 and 22). And these successive Ages haven't just happened of themselves. The Lord has been and is ever at work behind the scenes making sure the ground work is in place, all the time protecting our freewill or freedom to choose so as not to feel anything imposed on us.

The Christmas event, His incarnation, was just one of those interventions into the situation, its real – and utterly vital – purpose mostly hidden from people. And, as touched on earlier, it opened the way for a new Age to sweep in thereafter. So too, the Last Judgement and the revelation of the internal or spiritual meaning of the bible in the 1700's was another, paving the way for the new Age dimly dawning in our day.

It is on the basis of these realities that my colleague spoke of himself as "a short term pessimist and a long term optimist". And, once thought about, I became one, too. We can use that freewill we have to undo and destroy it all, (of this there can be no doubt) but as the Lord would have it be the future for humankind is full of light and brightness, of deeper and more meaningful connection with Him and of living in far more real trust, care and compassion with each other, being spiritually motivated in doing so.

May His Peace and Blessing be with you at all times.




#### **News of People**

#### THE PILLARS OF NEW CHURCH BELIEFS

Continuing a series on our beliefs in plain English by Rev. Julian Duckworth (Sydney).

This time we'll think about HOLINESS.

The word *holy* is closely linked to two other good words – heal and whole. Some churches offer healing services to help people become whole. Today, most people know that a holistic approach to life means looking at everything together, mind, body and spirit. This is very different from the popular idea of holy as something set apart or revered. A church building can be seen as a holy place – or place of holiness – because people get help from its quietness, or feel its

atmosphere or the beauty and awe of its décor. It is not of the world.

So while we might need and value such helps and reminders, we shouldn't limit holiness to them. There is personal holiness in many people's lives when they live sincerely, act authentically, carefully manage the way they respond to the people they are with and choose to join in things or not join in as they see fit.

People like this set their personal standards very high but they aren't walking around in white robes. You might not notice any difference about them to anyone else, but when you get to know someone like this fairly well, you begin to sense there is something special about them

So try and see holiness more completely rather than compartmentally. It all comes from God and this is the ground of everything holy. See it in ordinary things like a box of matches or a toothpick – yes it's there. See it in astounding things like the motionless hovering of a hawk and its sudden plunge. But most of all see it in humanity and the endeavours of those who wish good to all others.

Wherever you see it, God is being received in holy ground.

We are all judged after death according to our deeds. It is not that these deeds are tallied up but that we return to them and behave in the same way. Death is a continuation of life. (Divine Providence 277)
