A Christmas Message ~ The Messiah

Adapted from an address by Rev. Dr David Fekete, USA New Church Minister

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned. (Isaiah 9:2).

So the prophet Isaiah speaks of the time of Jesus. Jesus came in the night, in the darkness. In the northern hemisphere, He came in the darkest season of the year. And he came at a time in human history that was equally dark. So the apostle John says, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5). That one birth - in the



darkness of night, in the darkest season of the year, in a dark time in human history - shone so brightly that now, two thousand years later, his light still enlightens those who receive him.

Jesus is called "The Messiah". 'Messiah' is a Hebrew word, the Greek translation for which is "Christ." So Jesus Christ isn't just a first and last name. It means that Jesus is the Messiah, the Christ. We immediately think of Jesus when we hear the name 'Messiah'. We may think of Handel's wonderful composition, "The Messiah," which contains many of Isaiah's prophesies about the coming of the Lord. But to fully understand who the Messiah is, we need to go back into Jewish history. Then we will better appreciate the hopes of the Israelites for the Messiah to come, and we will understand how dark the world appeared to them at the time of the incarnation.

In Hebrew, the word "Messiah" means "anointed." In the Word, a 'messiah' is a king in Israel, who is anointed with oil by a prophet when he is chosen by God. Each time a new king was chosen by God, a prophet would anoint the new king with oil. But there was one special Messiah, one special king, whom we mean when we talk about the "Messiah" in capital letters. That king is David and God made a special promise - the "Messianic promise" to him that there would always be one of his descendants on the throne in Judah, forever (see 2 Samuel chapters 11, 12, 15, 16). Despite interruptions to this kingship through various conquests of Judah and Israel by the Babylonians, the Greeks and finally the Romans when it appeared that God had broken his promise to the Israelites, hope persisted that one day, a descendant of King David would return and assume the throne in Jerusalem.

From our Swedenborgian perspective, like the latter prophets, we too see the time of Jesus as a time of great darkness. Indeed, we see it as the darkest time the world had ever known. It was a time desperately in need of Jesus' redeeming light. It was a time in need of God's Incarnation. Our Church teachings clearly show that the forces of darkness threatened to overwhelm heaven and earth before the Incarnation. We believe that without God's Incarnation, humanity would have been lost, but that with the advent of Jesus, God's power came to humans - and through the divine humanity of Jesus Christ, God could come to humanity in a new way.

Jesus is that divine Messiah who calls God his father. With the incarnation, God became present to humanity in a way that had not been possible before. Throughout his life on earth, Jesus grew progressively closer to God, and God grew progressively closer to Jesus, until ultimately God and man became one. So Jesus says in John 10:30, "I and the Father are one."

With wonder, we can think back on those days when Jesus walked on earth - O happy day! With awe, we can think back on those who felt their hearts burn within them in Jesus' presence. But despite the appearance of a world in which there is much conflict and fear, Jesus is with us still in his divine humanity bringing light and goodwill to all who turn away from selfish and solely worldly approaches to life. For us, in reading and living His Word, The Messiah will be present with us not only at Christmas but for all time.

All members and friends of The New Church in Victoria, and people everywhere, are wished a most blessed celebration of our Lord's birth into the world. May 2016 bring personal happiness and worldly harmony.



Judy's personal approach was well appreciated by all present. Towards the service end came the formal introduction to membership of the Church with Karl Robinson and Neville Jarvis inviting Norma Whelan and John Cook to come before the congregation to express their belief in the Sacred Scriptures and the teachings of the New Church as the means for leading a spiritual life. It was lovely to have Norma's daughter Robyn with us for this occasion.

After the service and refreshments, those members and friends who wished to stay on for a special members' meeting assembled in the hall. After being elected to take the chair, Karl Robinson explained that after a number of years as Society Secretary, Kim Bentley had decided to step down and the Committee had been delighted that Sophy Athan had agreed to assume this important role. Kim was thanked for his contribution over the years. Being the first general meeting since his passing into the spiritual world, a minute's silence took place to remember our beloved former Minister, the Rev. Chris Skinner.

The first two items on the agenda were to formally appoint Norma Whelan and John Cook as members of The New Church in Victoria by their signing of the Members Roll. They were welcomed into membership with enthusiastic applause.

A completely new Constitution for the Society, which had been worked on by several members over a long period, was tabled. With changes in legislation, the current Constitution was well out of date and it was important that it be replaced by a modern one which met current legal requirements and the needs of the Society. The new Constitution was unanimously approved.

Over a buffet-style homemade lunch, kindly and generously provided by Judy Robinson, the meeting continued with the fourth item on the Agenda ~ consideration of establishing a path towards a viable long term future for the New Church in Victoria. Discussion involved activities and suitable leadership to offer more people our helpful life-related teachings and generating the means for achieving this. The Church Board will now proceed to fully examine the feasibility of all options in terms of enabling the Church to better fulfil its objectives, with relocation to more suitable premises being a possibility.



THE PILLARS OF NEW CHURCH BELIEFS

Continuing a series on our beliefs in plain English by Rev. Julian Duckworth (Sydney).

This time we'll think about our **CONSCIENCE**.

The classic picture about conscience is the role of Jiminy cricket in the cartoon film 'Pinocchio' as the puppet goes from this wrong to that foolishness. Jiminy Cricket harangues him with what is the better thing he should do.

And many people see conscience to be just that - a mental 'tap on our shoulder'. Hey, you can do better than that! And while that can be useful, it's a bit sad

to think of a person who keeps needing to be told not to do what they feel like doing. It doesn't seem to make any progress.

Real conscience according to our teachings is about making progress and making use of what you know is the better thing to do. In fact, the word 'conscience' simple means with Knowledge. So conscience gets into gear when you have sorted out a few things and you know that some things are right and that some things are plain wrong.

When you have got that far, it is then up to you to start living by your conscience - or knowledge - of such opposite choices, and to try and develop a clear conscience. Words like sincere, authentic, honest, upright, even fair, all seem part of such a life.

It doesn't make you a perfect person though. You'll still get drawn into tangles. But it equips you, and it gives you a good reference point. Unlike Pinocchio, you don't wish it would shut up and go away or carry on regardless.

And we're told that as we practise our love for God and love for each other, we build up a conscience which in fact is a wonderful gift from God. God wants us to make good choices and understand why, because when we do, we find we are more settled, surer, and kinder people.
