

The word is linked to a very old English word which means 'Spring time', and traditionally it was the occasion for spring cleaning your house – for sorting out your belongings, throwing away stuff no longer usable, and cleaning rooms from top to bottom. The result (if you do it) is that everything inside is fresh to match the new growth outside.



As a Christian festival, Lent is a time for us to spring clean our souls. It's a time to take stock of what we LOVE to do, what we BELIEVE to be true, and what we actually DO to and for other people.

Days and years speed along more and more quickly, and we tend to let our Christianity go off the boil. Lent is a time for putting this right. Lent also marks the approach of EASTER, so it reminds us to make a serious effort to remember what Jesus suffered during the last 6 weeks of His life on earth, symbolized by the 40 days and nights which He spent in the wilderness without food and being tempted to act from selfish motives - read the record in Matthew 4:1-11.

Why did Jesus choose to let Himself be tempted like this? It was so that the power of His Divine Love could be seen and felt and known. The power of Jesus' love for mankind brought Him (safely and successfully) through all the temptation-attacks which the devils of hell could make on Him.

At Easter, His resurrection showed that His love had made Him GOD ALL THROUGH so that death was not the end of Him, and never will be. The 40 days of Lent will be of no use to us unless we remember how much God loves us - all of us - each of us.

Suppose that while we are spring cleaning our souls we realise that we have developed habits of being selfish, or of not telling the truth as much as we can, or of putting our own interests before anyone else's. OK, we are all tempted to do such things just as Jesus was tempted to look after His own needs, to save Himself from harm, and to act as if He were an earthly dictator. But He will use the power of His love to overcome these

inclinations in all of us - IF WE LET HIM DO SO.

But why does He risk us giving in to temptation when it ambushes us? Simply, so that we can grasp the essential truth, that without God's love we can find and experience and enjoy no real happiness in our lives.

During Lent this year (Wednesday February 10th to Thursday 24th March 2016), let's be determined to make time to think about God's love for us. Remember that His love never stopped in spite of what people did to Him during His earthly life as Jesus, and it never ceases now, in spite of our preoccupation with living in this busy world. In the words of a well-loved hymn, "Take time to be holy." The result is that we'll be readier than ever before to praise our Lord God Jesus Christ at Easter when we celebrate His conquest of evil for ever.

The Path: The Inner Life of Jesus Christ

The Gospels tell us something about the major events in Jesus' life, especially during the last 3 years of his life, and his approach for living in true kindness towards others. They provide little indication what was going on in his heart and mind when with his disciples or dealing with the authorities of the time.

Our Church teachings provide us with the ability to understand something of this inner process which the majority of Christians would think is impossible to know. The twelve volume work by Emanuel Swedenborg, *Arcana Caelestia* or *Secrets of Heaven*, of which seven (two to eight) refer to the Genesis stories of Abram and Sarai, Isaac through to Joseph. Swedenborg explains in great detail how these stories are divinely-inspired accounts of the inner life of Jesus from birth to his resurrection. Symbolically they reveal the inner development, intense struggles and triumphs of Jesus as he developed and forged a path of love and wisdom for us to follow.

In the 260 pages of his book, *The Path*, Geoffrey Childs summarises Swedenborg's exposition into a thoughtful and moving study. While not a substitute for Swedenborg's work itself, it provides a very helpful overview and clearly shows how Jesus fought against and overcame evils that beset us all. We too can fight in his strength and enter into the joy of his victory by following his path. A useful read leading up to Easter.



Thinking About Harvest - First Fruits

When you come into the land that I give you and reap its harvest, you shall bring the sheaf of the first fruits of your harvest to the priest, and he shall wave the sheaf before the Lord, so that you may be accepted. Leviticus 23:10-11

Bringing of 'first fruits' to the Lord included all these: the first fruits, the first grain, the first wine, the first shearing, the first oil



In Galatians 5 the apostle Paul says: But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control.

amounted to about one-fiftieth of

the entire crop.

From these words we can perhaps see that our 'fruits' are the good and true things in our lives such as love and faithfulness that can grow and develop year after year. But these are not really our own as Jesus says: I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing.

For the Israelites, the offerings of 'first fruits' were a thanksgiving for all the fruits of the earth and an acknowledgment that these came from God alone. And it was an affirmation that this was the most important thing or 'first' thing they should do with the fruits of harvest. And it can be the same, spiritually, for us.

The most important thing or 'first' thing we can do when reflecting on the good and true feelings and thoughts that come to fruition in our lives is to offer them in service to the Lord acknowledging they come from him alone and not from ourselves.


News of People and Events

THE PILLARS OF NEW CHURCH BELIEFS

Continuing a series on our beliefs in plain English by Rev. Julian Duckworth (Sydney).

This time we'll think about TAKING RESPONSIBILITY

This might seem a strange heading for a religious beliefs page, but it is something which runs right through all our church teachings - the point that ultimately we take responsibility and make our own choices and decisions.

Sometimes religion seems to come across as the need to get it right to be acceptable to God. There is something in that of course - we should try and do

what we know is right, and God tells us the things that are right and true.

But the downside of that is that it can leave us wondering if we are ever good enough. It's as though we are striving to please someone else - in this case, God - rather like a school student trying hard to please his teacher

God is not really that interested in how much good we try to achieve, he is only concerned that we genuinely prefer what is good to what is evil. He looks at our heart while we look on the outside at our record.

Taking responsibility, then, is something that God puts in your court. Rather than trying so hard to live up to some ideal you feel is the pass mark or which warrants a merit or distinction - we become responsible for what we choose to be and do.

We can and should take responsibility for the good we want to do, and set out to be of some use in this life, to others, to our community, and even to life itself.

And we should do the same thing with whatever bad we find we get caught up in, whatever that may be - usually they're thoughts - and take a stand and say something like 'I will decide what I will think about, not you!' And God will commend us for that.
