Do You Still Do It?

Most years, stories are told in the media of how, in the good old days, spring was the time of the year to give the whole house a thorough "clean". The accumulated dirt and dust would be eliminated as windows, walls and paintwork were washed down, carpets and rugs taken outside and banged, curtains washed and changed, cupboards and drawers cleaned, and much more beside. At the same time, the man of the house was expected to do some decorating.

Some of that way of life remains but few nowadays feel it necessary to



spring clean on the same scale. I don't need to explain the reasons — the changes in the way we run our homes, and in social patterns with women far more active in the workforce. Like most natural patterns of life, this old routine of spring-cleaning does have a spiritual counterpart. And, in this case,

there is no danger of it becoming obsolete. Actually, the natural cycles of life take their form from this inner dimension, not the other way round. That's a very important universal principle to remember, otherwise we have a topsy-turvy view of life. Life begins with our Creator, and flows out through several levels, coming to rest in the natural kingdom. So the daily pattern of day and night, and the annual seasonal cycle, are a reflection of what is going on within human nature and behaviour. For example, the daily change from light to darkness corresponds to the way we turn away from being in the light and warmth of our Maker's life to the dark and cold of human self-centredness.

Spring is clearly a time of renewal and fresh growth, coming out of a phase of apparently dormant activity. In our case, renewal and fresh growth can only emerge when we have willingly and deliberately undertaken a period of "spring cleaning". Outwardly, it may appear to others that nothing much has been going on. But a genuine determination to take a long, hard look at our life, with a desire for change, will always bring benefits and blessings to ourself and to the people around us. It will be like that amazing rush of growth in the gardens and fields at this time of year.

Nowadays, people prefer not to think about sin, as though in some way there is a negative reflection upon them, or a judgmental criticism of their lifestyle. But, you know, sin is simply speaking about the way we men and women "miss the mark". In other words, so often we live in such a way that we're missing the whole point of life. Instead of being gentle and kindly, loving and forgiving, faithful and generous, we behave badly in so many ways. When we live that way, while we certainly make life difficult for others, it is we, ourselves, who are the greatest losers. We are damaging our own character, and the implications for us are serious if we allow "sinful" ways to become normal.

That is why it is so important for us to engage in periodic spiritual spring cleaning, when we evaluate what our priorities are, and assess the state of our relationships with our nearest and dearest – and with God! We can undertake this personal review at any time of the year, of course, not just in the spring. (Springtime simply reminds us. The start of a new year acts in a similar way.) If we are at all spiritually aware, we do this on a small scale as we go along. But we do need an occasional major self examination. This is what Jesus Christ gave His life for, creating for us the freedom to grow strong in character if we want to. His resurrection from death means He is always available to help us and fill us with His Spirit during our major overhauls. How foolish and short-sighted we are if we neglect to take stock.

Spiritual Living - The Golden Rule

One of the fundamental moral principles found in nearly all religions is the concept of "do unto others as you would have them do unto you" – this is the 'Golden Rule'. Examples of this approach to life can be found in many sacred scriptures:


Christianity

So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets. Matthew 7:12

Confucianism

Do not do to others what you would not like yourself. Then there will be no resentment against you, either in the family or in the state.

Analects 15:23



Buddhism

Hurt not others in ways that you yourself would find hurtful. Udana-Varga 5:18

Hinduism

This is the sum of duty; do not do to others what you would not have them do unto you. Mahabharata 5:1517

Islam

No one of you is a believer until he desires for his brother that which he desires for himself. Sunnah

Judaism

What is hateful to you, do not do to your fellowman. This is the entire Law; all the rest is commentary. Talmud, Shabbat 31a

Accepting the Golden Rule as a principle for living adds a completely new dimension to the meaning of life. It emphasises that we should not act in our own interests regardless of others but rather see ourselves as part of a wider community in which we want to build a reciprocal relationship with others based on goodwill. And the fact that this 'rule' appears throughout world religious texts encourages us to see that it should be applied regardless of race, religion or culture.

The American poet Edwin Markham wrote:

"We have committed the Golden Rule to memory; let us now commit it to life."

And this is where the difficulty arises. It is very easy to know we should apply this rule in daily living but another thing entirely to actually follow it in everything we do. Take a simple example like driving a car.

Imagine you are driving along an urban road in slow traffic desperate to make progress (an unfortunately common experience). You are about to pass a junction on your left from which several drivers are waiting to join your line of traffic. Do you (a) – ignore them completely and carry straight on regardless or do you (b) – waive to them to drive into line in front of you?

Now if we are honest with ourselves we probably adopt tactic (a) far more often than (b) because we see it as serving **our** purposes best – after all **we** want to get to where **we** are going! But the Golden Rule asks us to put ourselves in the other person's position – what would we want to happen if we were waiting at the junction. The answer, of course, is very clear but how often do we act upon it? And where does failing to follow the Golden Rule in driving lead us to? Well ultimately it can lead to such problems as 'road rage' which can have terrifying implications for those involved.

As we can see from this example, what we need to do to follow the Golden Rule is often quite simple but actually obeying it can prove quite difficult. All spiritual living involves three steps:

Step 1

Spiritual living starts in simply following some 'ideal' or 'rule' about how we should live, such as the Golden Rule. We look at the Golden Rule and see the sense that it is a good way to live – and then we try to obey it. In this way we get onto the first step in living spiritually according to the Golden Rule. This 'first step' is quite basic and 'down to earth' and has something of self-interest in it – after all we are "doing for others what we would wish them to do for us". But we can move on away from this rather self-interested approach.

Step 2

As we try harder and harder to follow this 'first step' and obey the 'rule' in all aspects of our lives we begin to appreciate the good this leads to for others. We are then ready to move on upwards to the 'second step' – we begin to follow the 'rule' not because we feel we have to obey it or because we see the value for ourselves but because we see the truth that it is a wise way to live. Following it has become easier because it is now part of the way we think about life and how it should be lived. We have replaced basic obedience with a developing wisdom.

Step 3

But there is a 'third step' in our spiritual growth – the step where love takes over. We no longer want to follow the 'rule' through simple obedience, nor because we see it is a wise way to live but because our love for others drives us to live that way.



All spiritual living needs to involve these three steps of growth from obedience through wisdom to love.

Emanuel Swedenborg commented on the difference between obedience and love when we are doing good for others:

Doing good from obedience is one thing, and doing good to the neighbour from an affection of love towards him is another. The difference is like that between the heat and light by night from the moon and stars, and the heat and light by day from the sun.

News of People and Events





THE PILLARS OF NEW CHURCH BELIEFS

Continuing a series on our beliefs in plain English by Rev. Julian Duckworth (Sydney).

This time we are thinking about **WHAT HAPPENS TO OUR EVILS?**

Let's start with some explanation. You and I are not evil. You and I are likely to be fairly normal well-intentioned people. But even so, simply by being human and because we get caught up in how things seem, we have evils which can influence us. Everybody does. Nobody is perfect.

Even when we are living an active religious life and wanting to do what is good, various evil tendencies affect us. Part of religion is knowing this and knowing how to manage it properly. Nobody, least of all God, is blaming us for being like this. It is just how it is. Now we come to the point and can ask, What happens to our evils? What happens to them when we have turned away from their influence and seen what they can do to us (and yes, to other people too)? Some churches would say that when we turn to Jesus and make our personal commitment to him for what he has done for us, then our evils are no longer of any account and they are wiped away as if they never were. This is like saying that your belief in Jesus overrides everything else and to use the phrase 'I am saved' puts it very clearly. But the New Church doesn't go along with this. It says that when we turn to the Lord (as we should) we then work with the Lord in dealing with whatever evils are there in us. And when the Lord and we have sorted it out, then these evils are taken away, made dormant, but not wiped away as if they had never been.

The reason for this is that they can be brought back and shown to us as gentle reminders, never to accuse us but just to help us see our progress more clearly. They are over and done with, and dumped at the side, but if needed, we can be shown them, and that is to help us.
