## **FROM THE MINISTER**

### **WHEN IN ROME, DO AS THE ROMANS DO**

Assimilation is certainly high on the agenda these days. You don't need me to give you examples, either for or against, because they keep coming up. But here's one from this morning's radio news. In one of the western European countries, the ruling party has just given an edict, "Assimilate, or leave!" Why? Well, they have an election coming up later this year and the far-right far more extreme party than the one in government is riding high in the polls, as they are in many other European countries.

I feel for Europe. Norwegians are – or were – Norwegians, and many countries have a very long history behind them. So anyone coming in, by immigration or by being a refugee, needs to understand that. Yet they also have come from somewhere with its culture, language, religion and so on. Do we downplay that because they're now here, and insist they take up ours? It's a never-ending circular argument, and maybe that's how it has to be.

Over here, we're relatively free of a lot of this because from 1788 all non-indigenous people came in from elsewhere, and have since come in, in waves. We've integrated by and large and in the process allowed people to have and cherish their background and heritage. But we're now tighter and more watchful than we once were. It takes precious little to raise the fears and bring out opposition.

Does assimilation also have a spiritual aspect to it? Jesus said two

apparently opposite statements: “He who is not with me is against me” (Matthew 12.30) and yet “For he who is not against us is on our side” (Mark 9.40) I used to think that these were diametrically opposite statements – they look like that at a quick glance – but I believe they are the same truth put in two different ways. Jesus uses the word “against” in both of them. That’s the key in each one. If we are against the things of God, we are against. It’s also helpful to see that the first one is in the context of a person doing good in the Lord’s name while the second is about ‘Satan’ and doing evil. Two very different ‘contexts’.

On a more down to earth level, each of us should and can assimilate towards each other. That’s what love is all about. That kind of assimilation (notice the closeness of this world to ‘similar’) often shows itself, especially in a couple who have been together for many years, intimately. Even their facial expressions often come to resemble each other’s!

Assimilation between people – friendship, attraction, sharing, agreeing, being together and having respect – is something beautiful. Not the same but different, yet not letting that come between things. In a way that’s what we’re here for. It’s certainly what we should be aiming for and work towards. In the wider context of migrants and cultures, the same thing applies. Keep your culture because that’s your roots but also join us in the way we do things here.

Over it all is the Lord, the Father of us all. Never lose sight of that fact, especially when differences bother us or divide us. Nobody else is going to be just like you, and other people might find you hard to cope with just as you find them the same too. Concentrate on that and we drive in the wedge. Override that with patience and care and we discover the riches of the Lord’s creativity. “Behold, how good and how *pleasant* it is when brothers dwell together in unity.” (Psalm 133 verse 1) And let us pray for a more united, safer world for everyone, and their children and their children’s children.

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## **BIBLE STUDY IDEAS FOR THE YEAR**

Thinking about this year, I have come up with the following suggestions, though we are open to any requests as we go –

1. The stories of Elijah and Elisha, two prophets who both faced challenges and who stayed faithful to the Lord their God. These fascinating stories are found in 1 Kings 17 through to 2 Kings 9.
2. Jesus' disciples always make a helpful study for us as we too are disciples of the Lord. There are very many incidents in the gospels which directly involve some or all of the disciples.
3. Deuteronomy chapters 6, 7, 8 and 9 are just sublime. They read very much as though the Lord is speaking directly to us, with love, encouragement and some warnings.
4. Babylon, often referred to as the Scarlet Woman, is a picture of power, control, wealth and domination. It's there in places in the Old Testament and its nature and fall is described in the book of Revelation.

## SWEDENBORG CENTRE REPORT

The Centre continues to receive enquiries and phone calls from people who have recently happily encountered Swedenborg's writings for the first time in answer to a lifelong search for a deeper understanding of spiritual life or of the Bible. A newcomer's delight is often seen by their frequently posed questions: "Why didn't I come across his work before?" and "Why is his work not more famous?"

Not long after the Centre's presence at an enjoyable Family Camp at Stanwell Tops, we took the books of Swedenborg's writings to the Afterlife Explorer's Conference in Byron which attracted a good deal of interest and discussion from a wide range of backgrounds of conference attendees. The conference was followed by a "Close Encounters Conference" on the discussion of life from other planets, so it's perhaps not surprising that Swedenborg's book *Earths in the Universe* ("EU", also known as *Life on Other Planets*) drew the greatest interest. Swedenborg no doubt wrote that work as a drawcard using a popular topic which could engage people to look more closely at the Writings. A pamphlet by Wilson Van Dusen was handed to purchasers of EU in which Van Dusen points out that the alien life Swedenborg described were communities in the spiritual world which correspond to states we might encounter on our exodus from Egypt (our scientific, natural thinking) and on our regenerative journey to reach Canaan (the Lord's Celestial Kingdom brought to life in us). This interpretation is supported by the fact that in the Heavenly Secrets the EU material can only be found among the chapters dealing with Exodus.

Apart from the illusions display about trusting our senses, another item which attracted attention at that conference was our USB memory stick (16 Gigabytes) which contains a great deal of resource material of interest relating to Swedenborg and many of his works. The intention

## **THE PILLARS OF NEW CHURCH BELIEFS**

Continuing a series about our beliefs in plain English. This month it is about **THE LOVE OF GOD**
