FROM THE MINISTER

THE NEW JERUSALEM

This month, on June 19th or thereabouts we celebrate New Church Day. Part of its meaning is linked with the vision of the Holy City in Revelation 21, descending out of heaven from God, a description of spiritual perfection, clarity, balance and perhaps most of all of a person or a community in which the presence of God is everywhere, being its very light.

I've been struck by the name of this visionary holy city being the New Jerusalem. I know we sometimes build cities and call them New York or New Orleans, or areas called New South Wales and New Zealand. Part of it is simply obvious; Jerusalem itself was the main city of Israel, the hub, and particularly where the Temple was. Jerusalem was an ancient site and is mentioned in an Egyptian inscription of around 2000 BC as Rusulamum.

The prophet Ezekiel describes an eight-chapter vision of "something like the structure of a city" but most of it describes a visionary temple. And the last verse of Ezekiel says "and the city's name shall be "Jehovah-shammah" (notice some similarity...) which means "The Lord is There."

In the New Church we see the New Jerusalem as a model of our regeneration and completeness or completion, which is why it is there in the last two chapters of the whole Bible. Everything about it is right and as Ezekiel says, "The Lord is There". Note that it is a city which

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has been built by people, but spiritually, this means the work that we have put into building our life on God's Word and truth.

Other religions have other views about the New Jerusalem, some physical and some spiritual. The Puritans took the idea very seriously in their pioneer work in the 'new world'. One large religion saw that the New Jerusalem would finally be established in Independence, Missouri.

Even the building of St Paul's Cathedral in London is said to contain elements of the New Jerusalem which pleases the British Israelites who believe that the ten lost tribes of Israel ended up on the shores of Britain.

And a devout Quaker, Jemima Wilkinson, started a New Jerusalem community in the seventeenth century by a lake near New York, now called Jerusalem, but it quickly died out after her death.

None of these beliefs or attempts should be ridiculed, because deep within the human spirit there is the sense of and the yearning for our perfection as ordained by God. The New Jerusalem is what we are intended to be, and may people's endeavours long continue towards that end.

But we still have a long way to go, not only individually, but also politically. Today's Jerusalem is seriously divided and causing one of the main barriers to effective peace talks in the Middle East, right now.

So we shall celebrate New Church Day on June 19th, the 18th for us in church that Sunday. Yet while that date comes and goes, the work of building the New Jerusalem carries on in us every day of our lives. Seeing a truth we didn't see before which spurs us on to try and live by it. Seeing something in our attitude or make-up which tends to stop us from getting any further along our spiritual path, and deciding to manage it better. Seeing other people in new ways and accepting and admiring them, or like William Blake (an ardent New Jerusalemite) said, "The tree that is before you is to some just an obstacle but to others a thing of exceptional beauty." And perhaps most of all, seeing your own great place in the whole scheme of things, a bit of the great city, the New Jerusalem.

page 8 THE MEANING OF THE NAME ISRAEL

יִשְׂרָאֵל

If you know your Bible you will know that the word "Israel" runs through it all the time from beginning to end; in fact, from Genesis 32 when God changed Jacob's name to Israel all the way through to the Holy City in Revelation 21. This makes it a very important feature of the Bible and one which concerns us too.

The name Israel means "he who strives or contends with God". Immediately we can see a whole area of meaning for us in that - all our questions about what goes on in life, the things each of us has to contend with, the difficulties we can sometimes have with believing in God, following God's teaching, reconciling this loving God and the innocent suffering which is there around us, and much more. So it is an accurate meaning.

Of course, Israel in the Bible can sometimes be understood politically, the "chosen people", the right to have the land which God promised to their forefathers. But the Bible is not about political justifications and rights, it is about the pathway of our own spiritual life and growth, each one of us. And this is carried by the name 'Israel' and all the hundreds of references to Israel in the Bible. This is actually why Israel is called the chosen people – God chooses us to live spiritual lives!

The Rabbis say something which is very helpful with this spiritual idea. They say that the name 'Israel' grows larger from beginning to end. If you go back to the Hebrew word at the top and start from the right hand end (Hebrew is written from right to left) the first letter on the right is the smallest letter. It's a Y. It's what Jesus meant when he said that "not a **jot** (this tiny letter) or a tittle will pass from the law until all is fulfilled". Then go to the other end and the big letter there. It's an L – by far the biggest letter in Hebrew. The name grows from small to large!

And this is what our spiritual life is intended to do.

SOCIETY NEWS

We had our Mothers Day service on Sunday May 14th and looked at the work of mothers through using the Biblical story of Hagar and Ishmael.

As well as being an explanation, I think it will also be useful in giving someone a general understanding of New Church teaching.

Winter begins for us on June 1st. It is our coldest time of the year and yet we don't have the extremes that some parts of the world have in their winters.

Winter is when the garden takes a rest. We might stay indoors that bit more. It is a time for going within and even becoming a bit

more reflective. Warming meals and curling up with a blanket and a good book.

Unlike spring and summer, winter gets mentioned much less in the Bible, perhaps because it is so cold and unproductive. Where it is used it is often as a contrast, like in God's words after the flood, "While the earth remains, seedtime and harvest and cold and heat and winter and summer and day and night shall not cease."

But there's one mention that sounds interesting. Jeremiah the prophet spoke about Israel's wrongdoing and dictated this to a scribe who wrote it down. The king heard about this and was furious and summoned his scribes to bring it and read it to him. And he burned it in the fire. And it says that the king was sitting in his winter house with a fire burning on the hearth before him. It seems appropriate, winter in the heart.

THE PILLARS OF NEW CHURCH BELIEFS



This time we're going to look at what is called our **BOOK OF LIFE**.

If I say to you that you are writing a book, you might be surprised. But you are writing one, even though it doesn't come out in print. It is your own personal book of your life.

This idea of us "writing" a book is also there in the Bible, mostly in Revelation, where it talks about those whose names are written in the Book of Life. That sounds a bit different, just having your name in the list, but of course to have it there we also need to be worthy to be included.

Our book of life we're writing every day, even all the time we live, is the imprint and record of our own decisions and choices. Even those that look as if they don't matter very much, like that moment when we couldn't be bothered to.

The important point about it is that none of it is held against us to stop us from being in heaven or being so bad that we must end up in hell. It is simply a record of everything. We go from this moment to that moment and forget all about what we felt yesterday, but the book doesn't; it keeps the recording.

It isn't even a book. It is really the collection of our thoughts about things, especially about people, and our feelings, but most of all it's about our decisions and our wish to be a better person or a more authentic person in spite of what might be going on for us.

And maybe while we sleep, things are getting filed in their right place inside us so that they can be accounted for. We won't be involved in reviewing during this life, but in the next life, we will have access to it, and we'll be able to say what we think about it all. And in fact, we will.

page 12 SWEDENBORG'S INFLUENCE

Some of us know that there are quite a few people who have been influenced by their awareness of Swedenborg's teachings. People like Helen Keller and William Blake come to mind, and even Australia's second Prime Minister, Alfred Deakin.

I sometimes wonder if we go too far in saying 'influenced by Swedenborg'. Sometimes it might only be 'aware of him'.

But recently I found a person with a definite stated influence of Swedenborg. This is Sibelius, the Finnish composer, who wrote 'Finlandia' and seven symphonies and so much else. He was married to a lady called Aino, who was very much into everything spiritual and supernatural.



His recent biographer wrote a three-volume in-depth life of Sibelius and mentions that Sibelius bought a copy of Martin Lamm's 'Life of Swedenborg' and said that he completely devoured it. And he (Sibelius) went on to say that Swedenborg's idea of everything being in divine harmony helped him to complete the writing of his 5th

Symphony which he had been struggling with. So next time you hear or sing Finlandia....
