FROM THE MINISTER

NOT KNOWING WHERE THINGS ARE KEPT

As you can imagine, we have been settling into our new home for exactly one month today. The stuff all got delivered on May 25th and most of you will know the process that then begins, of where to put things that were automatically findable only two weeks earlier into their new places. The result is chaos and confusion and panic. You all know where your pillow cases and woks are; be glad of that and never take it for granted.

There was, though, one redeeming feature. Our Welsh Dresser got everything put in exactly the same place here as they were back in Sydney. I confess sitting looking at this a few times with great affection because it was my oasis and proof of continuing sanity. But the other seven or eight chests, drawers, cupboards around the house continue to be places of fear and mystery.

However, time is the great healer and I am gradually building up a confident repertoire of likely hiding places for most things, far from completion as yet. I do know where the piano is of course, another important refuge when nothing else seems normal.

Most things in this present life seem to be parables of deeper realities. Maybe the Lord designed physical life deliberately to teach us and give us the direct experience of personal states and deeper things to make our own by choosing to. People say that space and time as we know it here disappear in the next life because we are all living in the moment, but I

for one don't put down the value of several decades coping with them to learn that there is a basic order to our lives which will stand us in good stead when we're in the next life living in the moment.

We are all likely to lose track at times or lose the plot. Whenever we allow a lingering unpleasant thought – usually involving someone else and not us! – to hang around limpet-like, we have lost it. One of my very favourite New Church teachings is the one about angels who come into a sense of evening twilight at times and a bit too much self-absorption, but being angels who love the Lord, they recognise this change very quickly and snap out of it by turning back to the Lord and feel better.

There is the Bible story of Saul. His father, Kish, had some donkeys which had wandered off and got lost. So Kish sent Saul and a servant to go and look for them. They couldn't find them anywhere, and Saul said, "Let's go back because my father might start worrying about us more than about the donkeys." The servant said, "Wait, in the city near here there is a man of God. Let's ask him." This was Samuel, and the Lord had said to him the day before that a man would come (Saul) and he was to be made the Commander of Israel. All this happened.

The loveliest bit in the story is that Samuel told Saul after anointing him, not to worry about the donkeys because they would go back to Kish. Little Bo Peep had it about right too. But the point is that searching for what was lost brought Saul to Samuel, the man of God. That is one of life's great truths, that when we search and look and try to get back what we feel we have lost, we may initially feel we're not what we were, but it's this which has the capacity (from the Lord) to bring us to a new discovery.

There are of courses, many losses in our lives; some are trivial, some are devastating and hard for us. They are united in the fact that this life is intended to teach us basic things, and in the truth that we are probably not looking at life in the right way. In them all, the Lord is there with us, managing our way through the maze, leading us, if we will be led, towards good outcomes. *Julian*

Here's a paragraph from our church teachings linked to the previous article.

"Before our natural mind is joined to our spiritual, we think whether we want self-love and worldly love to be done away with, and if we want to be ruled by what is spiritual. This is our freedom. Our natural mind would reject that, because it is full of such things, and afraid that life would be nothing without them. When some light flows from the Lord through heaven into our natural we begin to think differently. We start to understand what being led by good and truth from the Lord will bring us. And when we see that all the angels in heaven are like this and have a joy defying description, we go to war with our natural, wanting it to be fully dependent on the spiritual."

NOW THE GOOD NEWS!

The really good news is that the temporary 2 year visa for Howard, Debra and Lance Thompson has been fully approved by the authorities. This means that they can ship their things (which they have already prepared to do in early July), which will take about 6 weeks to arrive, they can book their flights (which they have done the morning they heard the good news, because the earlier you book...) and they will arrive in Sydney at 7.15 a.m. on Wednesday August 15th, after spending

two and a half weeks with their folks in Philadelphia. It all becomes very real now, they said. The 2 year visa will be able to change into permanent residency after we have secured the Labour Agreement.

At our end, it is the end of much waiting and uncertainty. The work on renovating the manse and the front two rooms facing the street is all taking place, as well as the vestry which Howard will use for his office, but now it is slotted along with the timetable we have. I am sure that we are just as pleased and relieved as they are.

One point is that their shipment is likely to arrive about one week after they do. The committee has been looking into booking a serviced apartment in Chatswood for the interval.

The next three months are going to be busy and exciting for us all. Be supportive of everything and perhaps also patient with how it all unfolds.

page 10 THE UPSIDES AND DOWNSIDES OF FENCES

Fences are there all around us. Your garden will have several of them. They may be your pride and joy or you may be very ashamed of them and their disrepair.



Fences divide, and that's their point.

This is ours and over there is yours! But we can always hang over the fence and have a neighbourly chat; perhaps in today's world a rarer thing than in the past.

Dogs know ever such a lot about fences and see them as yet another inhibition we humans put on them to restrict what they would just love to do if they had the chance. They also love to smell each post, one after the other, always when you've only got six minutes to take Rover down the road.

Fences must have an interesting history. We wonder who might have put up the very first fence ever, and suddenly turned the vast open plains into two parts. Which raises the interesting question: Suppose we (everybody) simply took down all our fences and began living in an open-planned classroom. Surely we would handle this perfectly well and it might completely change some of our biggest misperceptions of ownership. Plants would spread unhindered around us all. But what about washing lines? Let's have a really big one running the length of three gardens and actually begin to share.

Apparently, about 4000 years ago in coastal South America, the lovely early people there had no concept of fortification and lived in harmony each in their open village or settlement. People came and went and maybe the only problem was wondering where little Chuquaxipotal had wandered off to.

And suddenly (the archaeologists say) everything changed, for people came from afar, for overseas and brought a new paradigm called war.

And they began to seal the borders of their villages to fend off whoever might come to claim their prowess. Perhaps little Chuquaxipotal's parents thought this was a good move.

So we live with our fences and they won't get taken down in our lifetimes. Do notice, with the word 'fence' there is a lot of undesirable vocabulary that goes with it. We've already had fend off, but there's defender and defensive, and that sport with epees called fencing. It seems to say a lot about us. A hymn says, "We fence each other in with hate and war."



Regeneration is about becoming different or being transformed into a new being or into a person who now has a different understanding of life than previously. Part of this involves a major re-think about each other,

realising that this person is clearly very different to who I am but they are entitled to be like that, within reason. They have their rights and they carry their responsibilities. And surely coming together with mutual similarities and differences will always be enriching for us all.

One last upside of fences... In the Bible there are many mentions of taking the 'fenced cities'. These were the cities who stood against Israel and were fenced (but really 'walled') to stop enemies coming in and even more importantly, to stop those inside from having dealings with those outside. Think Jericho! But think about an entrenched attitude and it begins to add up and be personal.

The Israelites were **not** warmongers for the sake of it, although it can seem like that at times. They were the people of God. They are our spiritual commitment to the Lord which must take over and root out our own natural tendencies and resistance to obeying the Lord. These can sit tight in us for a very long time and even hold us back. So we are, in that way, to do battle with fenced cities and take them. The first step is to realise they are there and where they can be found.
