## September 2020

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## "<u>To Mask or Not To Mask</u>"

In last month's newsletter I opened the main article referencing a recent after-church conversation on the correspondence of the pandemic sweeping the world and what must be happening in the spiritual world. The short conclusion of this discussion was that, while it is very difficult for us to actually know what is happening in the spiritual world based on what we see happening in the natural world, it is probably not a coincidence that at the very time a pandemic is infecting the world many countries and societies are beginning to address generations-long systemic racism.

I then shared in the Newsletter a recent sermon touching on the subject of truth vs. falsity, a subject which is extremely important in the conversations we're having these days.


This month I thought I would turn my attention to another pandemicrelated subject. The inspiration for these thoughts goes back a few months when I saw a video clip of a very impassioned woman addressing a meeting of her local government. This woman wanted the assembled local representatives to know that she apposed governmental requirements for mask wearing on the basis that the masks represent the "mark of the beast."

While I may feel that statement is



sprinkled with more than a little hyperbole, the zeal with which the woman made the statement suggests she feels it is anything but hyperbole, it is true. So, though I may disagree with her conclusion I have been putting some thought to the subject of masks, face coverings and veils in the Bible and what the use of face masks may represent in our current struggle.

Searching the Word for incidents of mask wearing I began focusing on the word "veil" which, at least in my mind, was the closest thing to a "mask" that I would find in the Word. There are, as you may know, numerous incidents of the word "veil" and

several uses for it. Obviously their are several references to women wearing veils but the curtains used to seperate the divisions of the Tabernacle are also referred to veils. There are also many symbolic references to things being veiled as in obscured. In each of these incidents the purpose of the veil, almost universally, was about protection. This is seen most notably in the wearing of a veil by a woman as symbolic of the protection of her innocence. But Swedenborg's Writings also speak of spirits being veiled in order to protect them from evils.

While I can see the representative meaning of the word "veil" could be useful I did not feel that focusing on that specific word was giving me the insight and inspiration I was looking for. So I expanded my search to include incidents where people seemed to be wearing a veil/mask, specifically over the face as apposed to the larger covering usually



represented by a veil. That is when I had my little "aha! moment." Two incidents of people wearing what we would more readily recognise as a mask came to the fore; Exodus 34:33 and Leviticus 13:45.

In the Exodus account of the giving of the Ten Commandments we are told that when Moses came down from Mount Sinai his face shone and when he spoke to the people he had to veil his face (Exodus 34:33). This incident of someone veiling their face did not come up in my initial search, interestingly, because the Hebrew word used is not the same as the Hebrew word for "veil." The Hebrew word used is היעוד (macveh) which is pronounced mas\*veh', a very similar sound to our word "mask" just without the hard "k." I also



noted that this is the only incidence of this particular word in the entirety of the Word. In his work Apocalypse Explained Swedenborg notes that 'The shining of the face' signified the internal of the law, for that is in the light of heaven. He veiled his face when he spoke with the people because the internal of the Word was covered and thus obscured to that people **to protect them** from anything of its light (AE 937.4).



In the listing of the laws concerning leprosy (Leviticus 13) we are given this instruction, again, one involving covering at least a portion of the face but not specifically referencing a veil: "Those who suffer from a serious skin disease [leprosy] must tear their clothes and leave their hair uncombed. **They must cover their mouth and call out, 'Unclean!** 

## Unclean!"

Now, in the spiritual sense leprosy represents profanation or the mixing of what is Holy with what is unholy. And by profanation I am not speaking of the 'mixing' suggested by our conflicting motives. By profanation I am speaking of the twisting of what is taught by the Lord to serve purely selfish and evil ends. In tangible terms a priest who incites his congregation to massacre members of a different faith as their religious duty is likely guilty of profanation. There can be no more dire evil for the church than true profanation. Like the natural leprosy, profanation is something to be avoided as all costs, **something to be protected from.**  Unique from many references to veils in the Word these two incidents seem to have a particular relevance to our current situation. Aside from those masks being worn by healthcare professionals who are wearing specific masks to protect themselves most of us today are being asked to wear masks intended to protect others from our own unintended transmission of disease. Moses wore his "macveh" to protect the people from the overwhelming power of Divine Truth because, quite frankly, they couldn't handle the truth. An interesting element to consider given the way truth seems to have become a weapon in this fight against the pandemic. And the lepers wore their mouth coverings to protect people from their disease of profanation.

Of course you may be wondering what, from my study of this subject, I would recommend you do with respect to wearing a mask. Well, I'm sorry to disappoint you. I'm not going to tell you. I want to protect you from my own possible profanation. I encourage you to learn as much as you can about the challenges we are facing, I want you you to obey the laws of your State and your Country. And, having done that, I want you to exercise your own discernment and make a decision you feel is best. You see, I am far less interested in telling you **what** to think than I am interested in guiding you in **how** to think.

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## **Friendships We Make and Have**

People, of course, are social beings who meet and mix and enjoy being together in all kinds of ways spontaneous or planned. Little children romp, teens hang out, adults meet up and the elderly like someone with them at times on the park bench or there on the nursing home lounge.

One of the things which 2020 has brought about is the hardship over



the inability to get together with friends, felt by an incredibly large number of people. There's the phone for sure, and some still write letters and others meet online, but if we are not allowed to actually meet up, there's a sense of loss and an ache for normal human company. We are social beings! So, looking on the bright side, hopefully one of the outcomes from recent restrictions (or possibly still current) will be to value our friendships more than ever.

The whole area of forming friendships and having friends is a fascinating one which covers a lot of ground. Why exactly do any two (or more) people feel they want to become friends? Is it that there is a lot to be shared or is it an attraction in having differences? Maybe both are needed. Some might say that you just make friends with the people who happen to be there. If I can mention cruise ships in current times, there'd be a lot of people who swap contacts and promise to stay in touch after several weeks on board.

Then there are those people with whom you know you definitely would not be making friends. I wonder if they feel the same about you too? And there's the end of a friendship when one of two friends moves away, or dies, leaving a big hole hard to fill. This can also happen from some awkwardness that comes about and the friendship changes or simply fades. It served a real purpose but some things in life can't stay the same for ever.

Marriage is an interesting area from which to look at friendship. A married couple can also be each other's best friends or they may need others for friends to balance the relationship.

One teaching we have says that in real marriage love the joining of minds increases and so does friendship, so that friendship becomes as it were the face of that love and its outer garment. It says that friendship brings stability into marriage. (Have a look at Conjugial Love 214)

I have always deeply felt that when we are blessed with children who of course grow up for years in our home and receive parental care and direction, even discipline, that there is a time around a certain age where the parent-child relationship best changes into a friend-friend one. I suspect that this is how it is well likely to be in the spiritual world too, so let's start that here, but still honour our parents too.

The purest friendship in the Bible was the love of David and Jonathan who felt affinity and who exchanged possessions, and Jonathan sought to save David's life from the attacks of King Saul, Jonathan's father. Full of meaning of course, but a picture of close loyalty and unswerving friendship. Still with the Bible, there is the tragic picture in Psalm 55 where it says that "It is not one who hates me who exalts himself against me; then I could hide from him. But it was you, a man my equal, my companion and acquaintance. We took sweet counsel together, and walked to the house of God in the throng." (55:12-14) What on earth would have been happening to bring such a friendship to the point of betrayal?

In one of our teachings we are advised by Swedenborg to take care at the deeper level of our being about whom we make bosom friends with. The reason for this is not so much about this world but the spiritual world where people's true natures and states become more open. Many friendships will no doubt be kept to eternity, but suppose there is a one-way friendship, an over-dependency or a simulated friendship, then

after death, such associations can be incredibly hard to disengage from, and be distressing. (True Christian Religion 446-449)

We have the delight of having friends and meeting up or keeping in good touch with them because we love each other. Something 'works' between us. And we also need to be wise for everyone's sake and realise that friendship is precious, a gift from the Lord, and to be handled well.
